FROM THE CHAPLAINS DESK

Kindness to the poor is a loan to the LORD, and he will repay the lender."

Proverbs 19:17

Charles Dickens published his beloved novel A Christmas Carol in 1842, in the midst of a period of English history known as the "Hungry Forties." This was a time of incredibly high wage gaps for factory workers and other labourers, because of which many incurred massive and unpayable debts. If you could not pay, it was not uncommon for a debt-collector to show up and whisk you away to a debtor's prison. This is the setting in which the main character of A Christmas Carol, Ebenezer Scrooge, lives and thrives. He is on the end of having money, giving loans, and benefiting from the misfortune and poverty of others. But throughout the course of the novel, we come to learn that he is really the bankrupt one. He has lots of money, but an empty soul. It is thus which the three ghosts of Christmas past, present, and future come to reveal and correct.

And miraculously, Scrooge is changed. He sees the error of his ways and becomes a loving person, a generous person, the kind of person who uses what he has to bless others. His soul is spared through learning how to use what is his for the benefit of those less fortunate. The novel was a smash success in Dickens's day, and what's more, it had a major social impact. People became more generous as a result, and the darkest days of the "Hungry Forties" petered to a close.

At Christmas time, we reflect on the incredible generosity of God, giving himself to us in Christ for our salvation. And we are called, as people made in the image of God, to reflect that generosity to those in need around us, with whatever we have.
